
Family Resilience & Economic Empowerment

HAMPTON LOOKS TO CONNECT WITH RESIDENTS IN NEW WAYS

Will use Facebook Live, 'budget and brews' to gather public input during budget season

HAMPTON — In the past, Hampton officials have used online surveys to gather public input on the next year's budget.

This year, taking a nod from the Hampton police's Coffee with a Cop gatherings, the city's new strategy is to have smaller informal chats.

"We are going to do 'budget and brews' at Willow Oaks' McDonald's, over coffee, not al-

cohol, in the middle of the day," City Manager Mary Bunting said. "For those, after work, who might want to parttake of a little relaxing beverage, we will also have an evening session at Oozlefinch (Craft Brewery)."

Hampton will host five community input sessions as it prepares its 2021 budget for the fiscal year that begins July 1.

In addition to the socials, Bunting will host two Facebook Live sessions, one during the day and evening, for questions and feedback. The city will also host a traditional public meeting at Sandy Bottom Nature Park.

"We are trying to meet people where they are at and make sure we reach out to everyone so that they have an opportunity to give us any input in advance," she said.

At the Hampton City Council's most recent work session, city finance director Karl Daughtrey offered early projections on anticipated city revenue. Hampton expects to take in \$357.4 million across all revenue sources, an increase of \$11.2 million, or 3.2%, over the current year.
