


Our Mission:


Guiding Principles

- 1. Grand strategy: Lead the way toward Friendships, Safety, and Dreams
- **2. Aim higher:** We must start with the right mindset.
- 3. Leadership at all levels: Leadership matters.
- **4. Deliver Justice and Fairness:** It has been said that the opposite of poverty is justice. We believe this to be true.
- **5. Rigorous adherence to the data:** Intuitive decision-making leads to biased outcomes.
- **6. Employ data-driven performance management:** Develop and use measures that inform our progress around our essential functions.
- 7. Install evidence-based approaches for crime reduction: Social science has identified various approaches to public safety that have withstood rigorous evaluations.
- 8. Engage in Relational policing: Policing is inherently social. We can't expect our residents to trust nameless officers who remain little more than a generic concept in their minds as "the police" in their lives.
- **9. Reduce community gun violence**: Gun violence can destroy hope, inflict pain, suffering and trauma.

Guiding Principles

- 10. Find the most important problems and fix them: Two of the biggest failures in public safety are failing to properly diagnose and prioritize the problems that we are confronted with.
- 11. Secure the economic drivers of prosperity: Policing has an important impact on the economic success of a city. We must support our business community so that opportunity and resources are plentiful.
- 12. **Systematic collaboration:** We must build and maintain working partnerships with key health and safety partners.


Reducing Fatal and Non-Fatal Shootings



The New, Collaborative Approach

We will be using a focused deterrence approach — a crime reduction strategy in which carefully selected high-risk offenders and victims (prolific or particularly violent criminal offenders and/or their victims) receive concentrated law enforcement attention and, simultaneously, offers of concentrated wrap-around services through direct, persuasive communication and rigorous follow-up of these

commitments.1

Collaborative gun violence reduction

"We will tackle disproportionate rates of gun violence that occur in concentrated areas of our City amongst a limited group of actors & associates, because we want to minimize the loss of life, reduce community trauma, increase trust in government and make Hampton an even better/safer place to live, work, play and invest.

We will do so by engaging with those individuals & their associates who create the most crime in our community to save their lives and the lives of others while ensuring accountability to public safety

with the expectation that gun violence will be significantly reduced.

We will know that we have succeeded when fatal and non-fatal shootings are

reduced by 50% and citizen perception of safety is rated at 85% or higher within 5

years."

Dealing a spike in violence...

- Police captains will begin a rotating schedule of nightshift hours on a weekly basis to lead our violence crime reduction efforts. The rotation schedule will be published and available for all supervisors.
- We will add three additional detectives to focus on violent crimes. We will do this but shifting auto theft investigations to our traffic unit.
- Several investigative units will shift their focus to gun violence.
- Task force officers will dedicate weekend hours to the City of Hampton to expand our capacity to deal with violence.
- We are suspending internal and external training and dedicate the hours that we are gaining to reducing gun violence.
- We will engage in rotating foot patrols in violence crime hotspots.
- We are redeploying several administrative positions to patrol.

Dealing with a spike in violence...

- We are aligning the mission of our specialty units under the umbrella of gun violence.
- We will have a command level officer working every weekend to lead our gun violence deployment strategy.
- We are increasing the number of detectives whose full-time responsibility is gun violence.
- We've temporarily reassigned our task force officers to return to the city and focus on gun violence.
- Officers are assigned rotating foot patrols in gun violence hotspots.
- We are pausing internal and external training to provide us with additional hours to focus on gun violence.
- Have a corporal or sergeant assigned to manage the work that we are doing in each one of our major crime hotspots and hot zones.
- We will conduct weekend lineups at centralized location for joint mission planning.
- Administrative staff members will adjust their schedule to work weekends to focus on gun violence. Our violent crime impact teams will engage in a combination of vehicle patrols, foot patrols, and bicycle patrols, in our hotspots.
- We are partnering with other agencies and stakeholders to engage with those known to be involved in gun violence speaking in 'focused deterrence' fashion.
