

# HOME-ARP Qualified Populations (QP)

- 1. Homeless
- 2. At-risk of homelessness
- 3. Fleeing/Attempting to Flee Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, or Human Trafficking
- 4. Other Populations where assistance would:
  - a) Prevent family homelessness; or
  - b) Serve those with the Greatest Risk of Housing Instability

- 2. Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA)
- 3. Supportive Services
- 4. Non-congregate Shelter

# Qualified Population Supports & Gaps

- What challenges are agencies facing?
  - Lack of affordable/safe housing (stock, cost, access, landlords)
  - Needs for intensive case management, lack staff capacity
  - Barriers due to history/background
  - Facility barriers (NIMBY-ism)
  - Limited capital funding opportunities

# Qualified Population Supports & Gaps

- What critical gaps exist in providing services?
  - Lack of affordable/safe housing (stock, cost, access, landlords)
  - Outreach, case managers, & housing stabilization staff capacity
  - Lack of centralized services
  - Earned income too low to obtain/sustain housing
  - Lack of eviction prevention services
  - Long-term/chronic homeless services

Activity	Allocation	%
Affordable Rental Housing	\$800,000	41%
Supportive Services	\$1,050,000	54%
Operating & Capacity	\$104,965	5%
Total	\$1,954,965	100%

#### HOME-ARP Rental Housing

#### HOME-ARP Eligible Activities:

- Acquisition of standard rental housing
- Construction of rental housing
- Rehabilitation of rental housing
- Includes conversion of nonresidential buildings to housing

#### HOME-ARP Eligible Costs:

- Development hard and soft costs
- Relocation
- Operating cost assistance/reserves

### HOME-ARP Supportive Services

McKinney Vento Supportive Services and Homelessness Prevention Services Eligible Costs

- Child care
- Education services
- Employment assistance and job training
- Food
- Housing search and counseling services
- Legal Services
- Life skills training
- Mental Health Services
- Outpatient Health Services

- Outreach Services
- Substance abuse treatment services
- Transportation
- Case management
- Mediation
- Credit Repair
- Landlord/tenant liaison
- Services for special populations
- Financial Assistance Costs

## Hampton HOME-ARP Planning & implementation Steps

- Complete Community Input Process (Jan. 2023)
- Draft plan and publish for comment (Feb. 2023)
- Public Hearing/Council Adoption (Mar. 8<sup>th</sup> 2023)
- Submit Plan Amendment to HUD (Mar. 2023)
- HUD Plan Approval (Spring 2023)
- Application, Review, & Awards (Summer/Fall 2023)
