

Public Value Proposition for the City of Hampton

"Hampton will tackle disproportionate rates of gun violence that occur in concentrated areas of our city amongst a limited group of actors & associates, because we want to minimize the loss of life, reduce community trauma, increase trust in government and make Hampton an even better/safer place to live, work, play and invest.

We will do so by engaging with those individuals & their associates who create the most crime in our community to save their lives and the lives of others while ensuring accountability to public safety with the expectation that gun violence will be significantly reduced.

We will know that we have succeeded when fatal and non-fatal shootings are reduced by 50% and citizen perception of safety is rated at 85% or higher within 5 years."

Department Overview

- The Office of Youth and Young Adult Opportunities is dedicated to offering alternatives to violence, drugs, and gang involvement, addressing trauma, and providing support to returning citizens.
- As part of the Council's safe and clean priority, this department strives to connect Hampton families and neighborhoods with resources that improve well-being and safety. From community engagement to family services, neighborhood resources to grants, their mandate is to provide opportunities that enhance a better quality of life. The 2023 annual report highlights the office's achievements and progress between October 2022 to August 2023.





National Community Justice Action Fund

The National Community Justice Action Fund (CJAF) suggests that local authorities can effectively address the root causes of violence and provide critical services to communities by establishing long-term infrastructures for violence prevention.

The CJAF Violence Prevention Index (VPI) is a tool that incorporates public health principles and is essential for violence prevention and intervention programs. The VPI goes beyond traditional law enforcement and utilizes both government and community resources. While some areas may not apply to Hampton due to local regulations or Virginia legislation, the investment breakdown is customized to the region's specific priorities and modalities. To gain insight into the city's infrastructure and community resources, refer to the chart below.





Increase in Fatal & Non Fatal Incidents






FY 2024 Roadmap
