



Background


- "Safe & Clean" adopted as the city's effort to have departments collaborate and work intensively in defined areas to address issues of crime and blight.
- City Council adopted ordinances and policies to reduce crime and blight ("broken window theory")

- Reduce blight
- Ensure housing is kept to standards of safety

Strategies of Safe & Clean


- Implement new tools for enforcement

- Repairs on 15 homes with
 200+ volunteers
- +\$41,000 of volunteervalue

ABCD Pilot Areas North Phoebus Area



2020 Employment for TANF Grant

- Partnership between Human Services, Economic Development and Workforce Development
- TANF (Temporary Assistance to Needy Families)
- \$230,850 grant with \$25,650 local match
- Perform detailed assessments
- Provide supportive services
- Goal of coaching individuals to success

Purpose of the Assessments

- For current and former TANF recipients
- For those at or below 200% of the federal poverty level
 - Identify strengths of the individuals
 - Diagnose disabilities
 - Determine all services and supports needed for success

- Supports customers in obtaining employment, deciding on a career path and earning a living wage


Outcomes to Date




Safe & Clean: Part-I Offenses 5 Year Comparison & First Six Months of Year 2019








Safe & Clean Part-I Violent Offenses: Murder, Rape, Robbery & Aggravated Assault








Neighbors by Ring

HPD and Ring Partnership

The Hampton Police Division partnered with Ring in early 2019. -Since that time;

- Ring camera footage submitted in the portal has been used to assist in the investigation of numerous crimes throughout the city. Many of these crimes involve <u>firearm</u> <u>offenses</u> and <u>vehicle larcenies</u>.
- Hundreds of investigative leads have been submitted by Ring users for follow up.
- HPD is now capable of <u>requesting</u> <u>video and communicating directly</u> <u>with Ring users</u> in specific areas where crime has occurred.
- The Ring Neighbors Portal has proven to be a powerful investigative tool in the short period of time we have been using it.

Understanding the Problem of Stolen Firearms:

Where are the Guns Stolen From?

An analysis was conducted in the City of Hampton to determine where the majority of Firearms were stolen from. Information retrieved from the Hampton Police Division Records Management System (RMS) revealed that the majority of firearms were stolen during burglaries from year 2014 through year 2016. There was a shift for year 2017 through Year-to-Date (Jan.-Mar.) 2019. During that period, the majority of firearms were reported stolen during Larceny from Vehicle incidents. Vehicles were left unlocked and unattended by citizen and firearms stored in vehicles were unsecured and easily accessible by the offenders.


Once offenders obtain stolen firearms they can quickly elevate to committing violent crimes such as murder, robbery and aggravated assault. A stolen firearm in the hands of an offender empowers the criminal element and subjects more people to become victims of violent crime.
