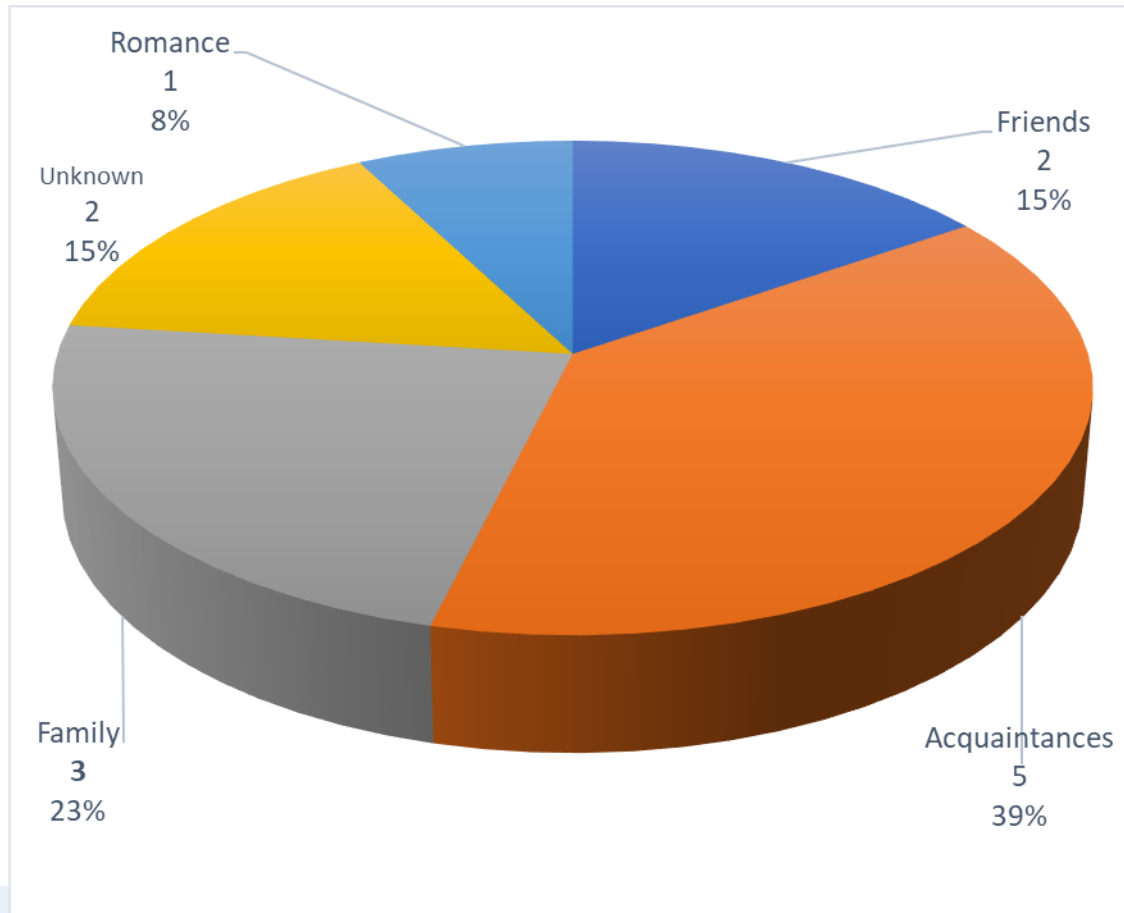

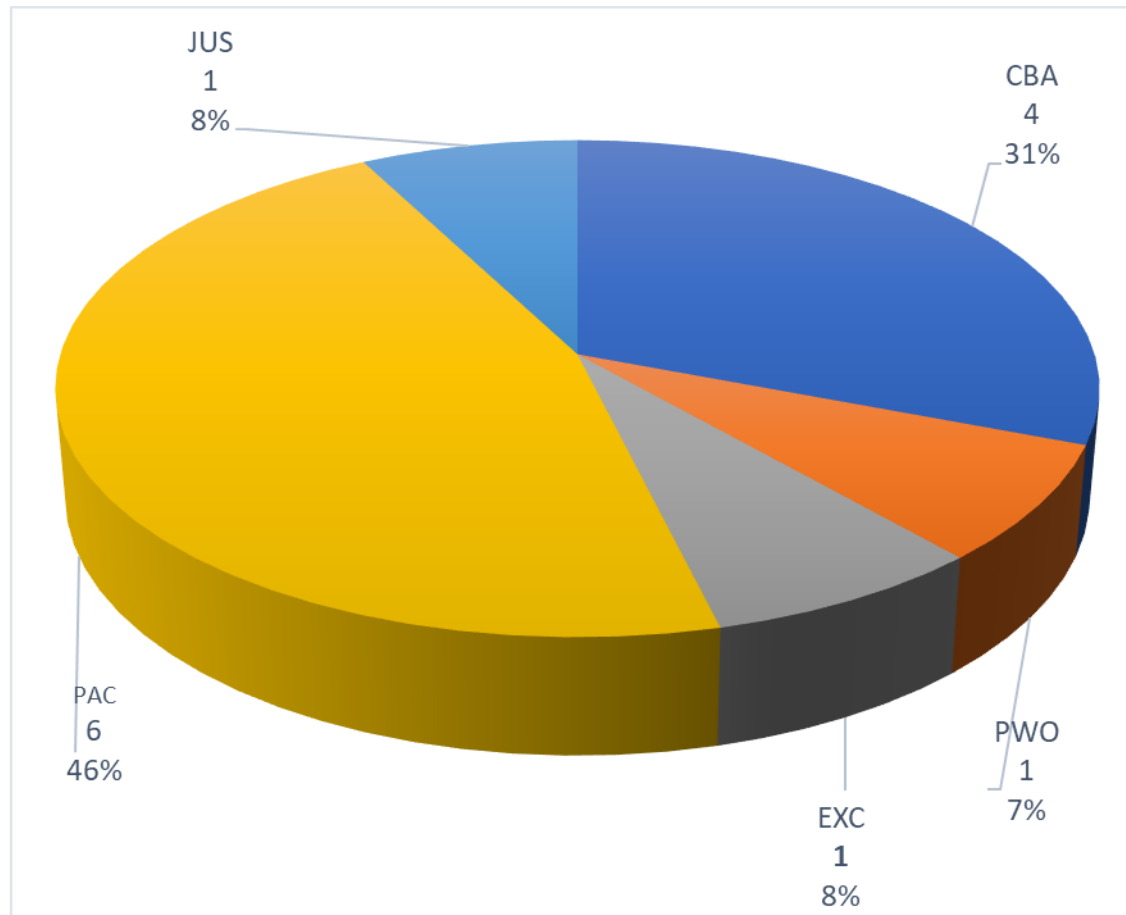

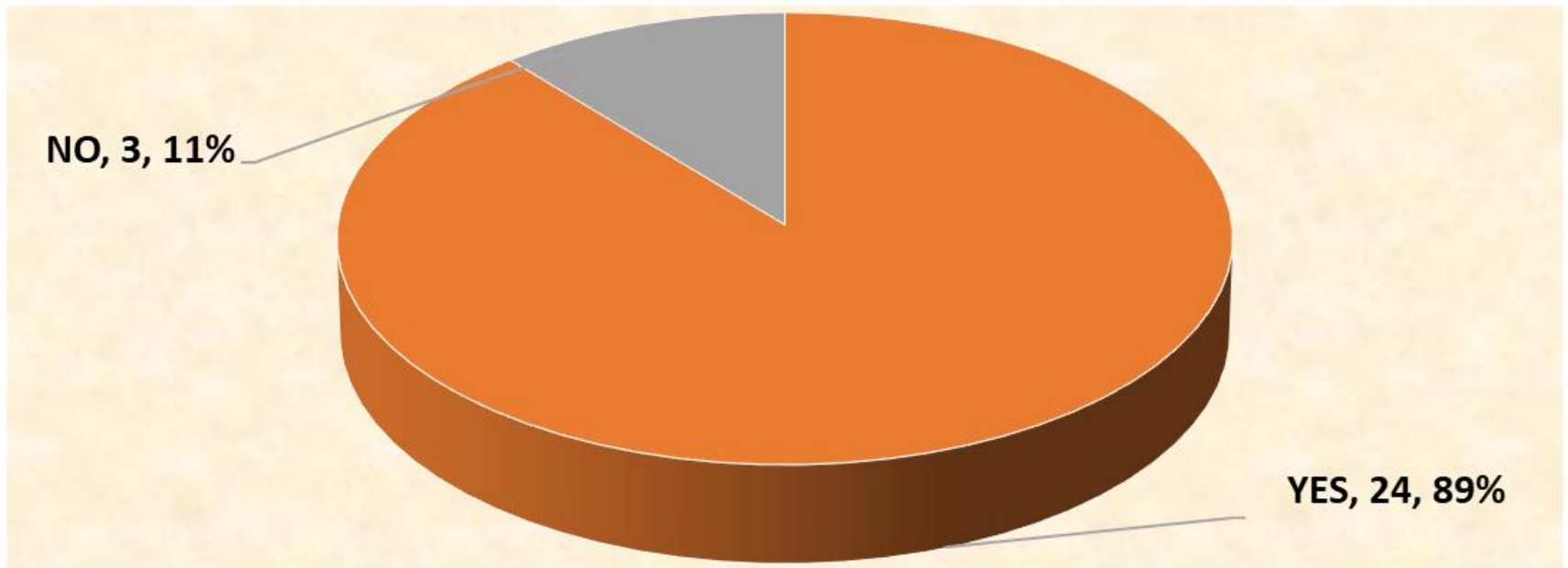

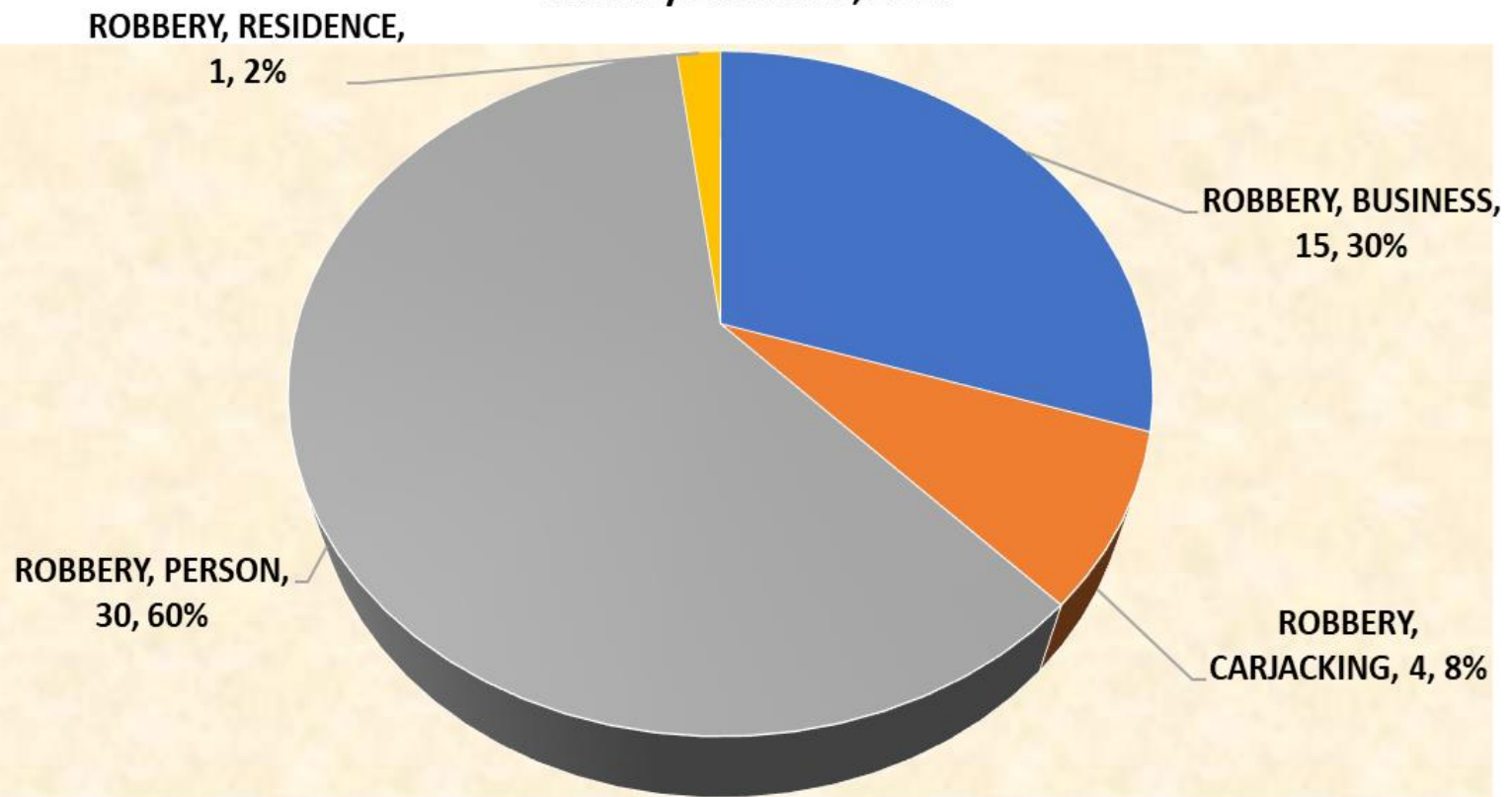
# **Reported Sexual Assaults Where Victim Knew Offender January 1-June 30, 2025**

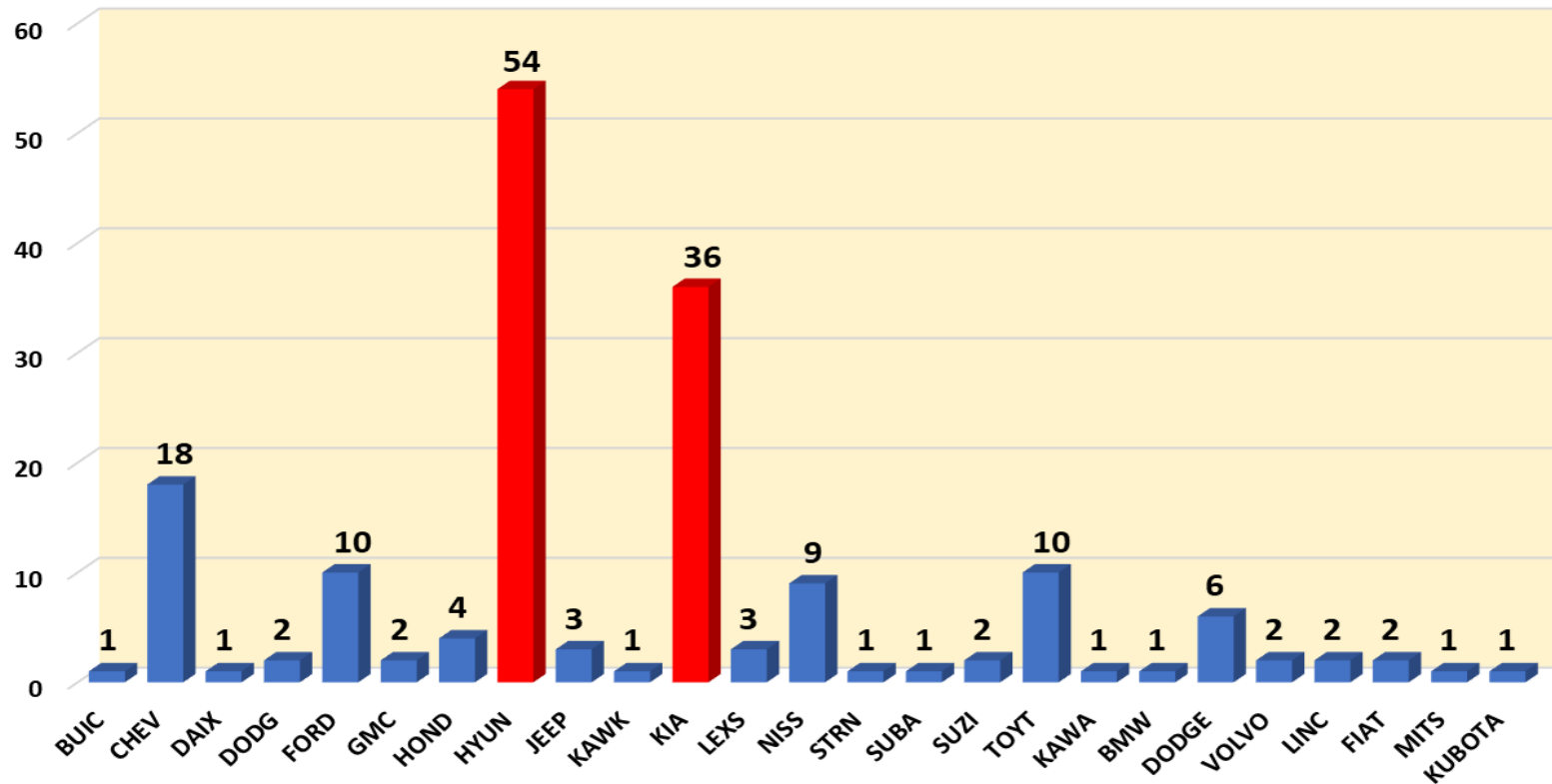

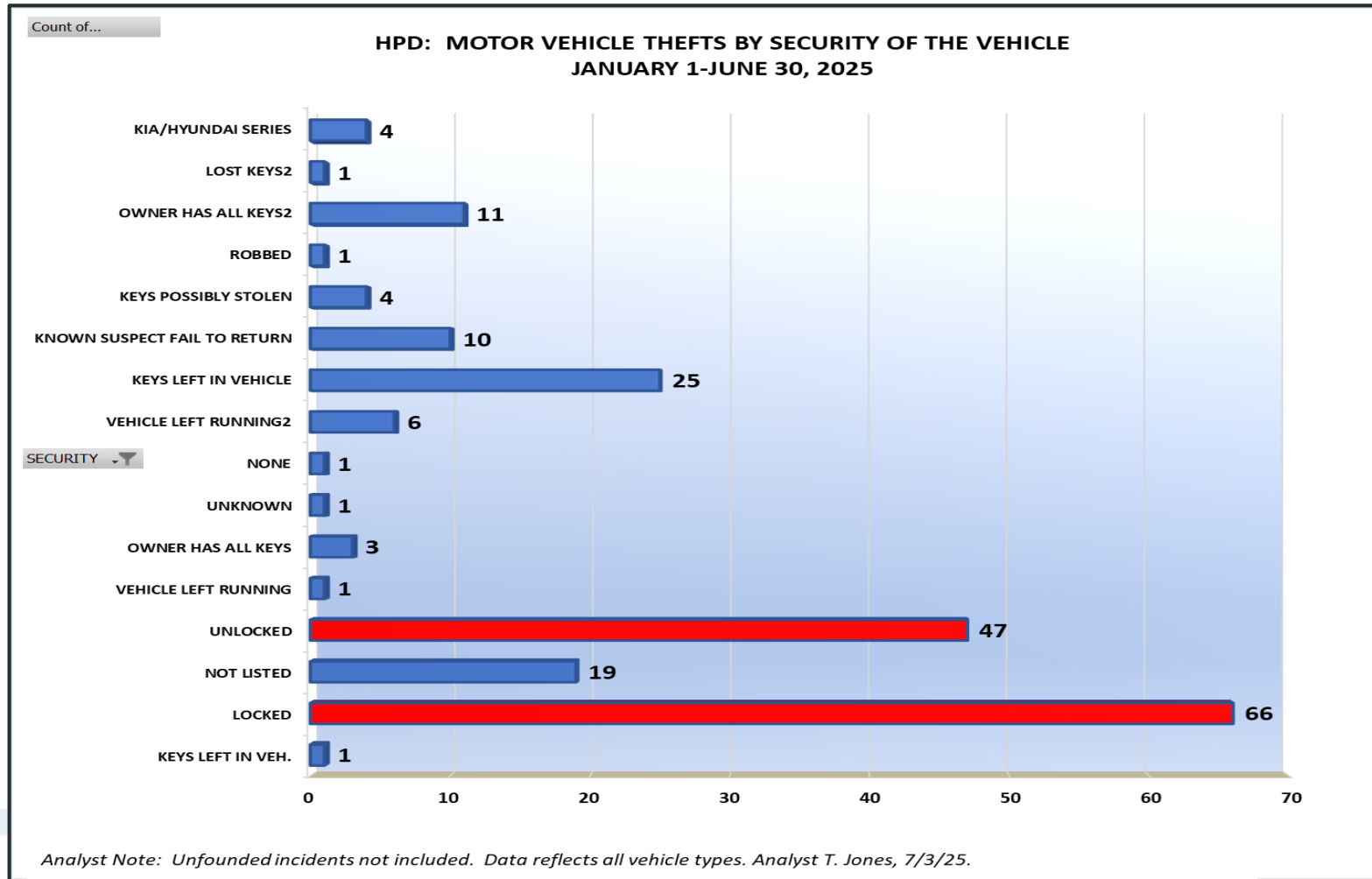

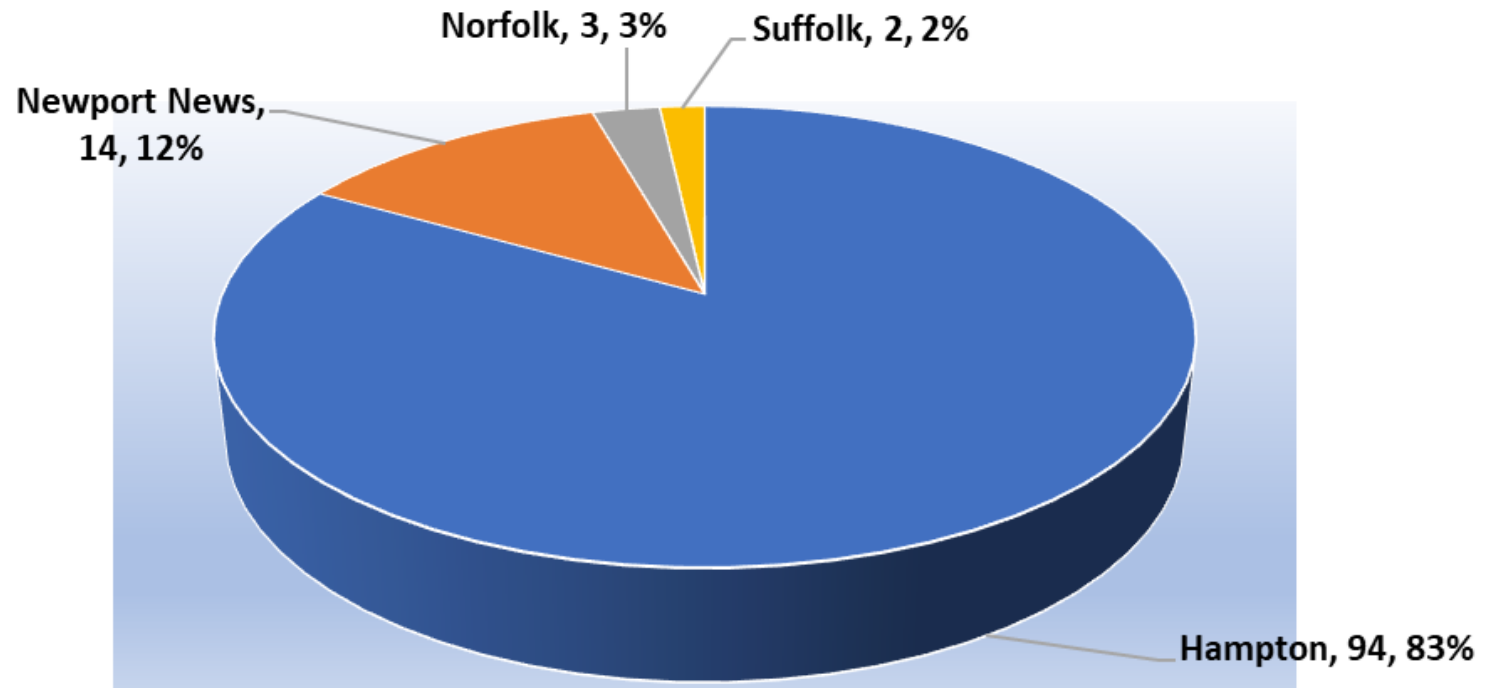
# Motor Vehicle Theft Analysis: Security Status January 1-June 30, 2025

# Addressing Crime Issues

- Crime is a community problem that requires a community solution.
- Requires problem-solving partnerships with the entire community including the faith community, businesses, community organizations, non-profits, concerned citizens, etc.
- Requires reinforcement of the community norm that violence is not an acceptable means of conflict resolution.
- Requires swift, fair and just consequences for those who do harm in our community.

# Proactive Efforts

- Over 500 officer initiated directed patrols in target areas of activity. Walking patrols, bicycles, all sport motorcycles, business contacts and traffic enforcement.
- Community engagements and recruiting in select neighborhoods.
- Business and hotel security training.
- Partnership with Community Development Department to engage neighborhoods.
- Neighborhood Watch revitalization



# Downtown Hampton

- Night Club Task Force enforcement and tours of after hour entertainment businesses
- Extra Duty officers and regular dialog with owners and managers
- 2 officers assigned to the downtown business district
- Homeland Security / Marine Patrol for the dock patrols
