### Hampton 2024 Legislative Requests

- Provide Localities the Authority to Regulate Blight in Neighborhoods:Vacant Building Registry
  - Passed both House & Senate; Signed by the Governor and took effect July 1st
- Add Municipal Park Rangers, 911 Operators and Animal Control Officers to the List of Local Employees Who Receive Enhanced Hazardous Duty Retirement Benefits
  - Passed Senate 40-0; Failed to pass in the House Appropriations Committee

### Hampton 2024 Legislative Requests

- Authorize Local Governments to Provide for the Lawful Seizure, Impounding, and Disposition of An Illegally Operated All-Terrain Vehicle (ATV)
  - Passed both House and Senate; Signed by the Governor and took effect July 1st
- Request a Code Change Related to Public Meetings Under FOIA (*Gloss v. Wheeler* fix)
  - Passed both House and Senate; signed by the Governor and took effect July 1st
- Request a Study of Virginia's Barrier Crimes Statutes Related to Credible Messengers
  - ☐ Failed to pass in House Rules Committee; The Speaker of the House requested a study by the Crime Commission

#### Hampton Budget Amendments

- **□** Fund Rental Increase for the Hampton Health District
  - No increase in final budget; discussions are ongoing
- ☐ Fund Rental Increase for the Hampton Human Services☐ Department
  - No increase in final budget

- \*Support Funding Request of \$1.5 million for Fort Wool Restoration Efforts
  - Not included in final budget

\*Not a direct request from Hampton

# **Special Session Budget Deal Highlights**

- Maintains the conference report language/funding to provide the state share of a three percent salary increase on July 1, of each year of the biennium for SOQ-recognized instructional and support positions
- Maintains the conference report approach to allow up to \$200 million the first year and \$50.0 million the second year in Literary Fund proceeds for school construction loans over the biennium
- Appropriates \$200 million each year of the biennial budget from the proceeds of state bonds to the water quality improvement fund for nutrient reduction projects at wastewater facilities across Virginia.
- Maintains the conference report increase in funding (\$10.0 million each year) for a total of \$296.65 million each year for localities with police departments.
- Provides approximately \$145 million for the Washington Metropolitan Transit system, toll relief in Hampton Roads

### 2024 Special Session I

- **□** Virginia Military Survivors and Dependents Program (VMSDEP)
  - The legislation fully repealed the changes to VMSDEP and related tuition waivers and provided an additional \$90 million from the FY 2024 surplus to offset costs of the program. When added to the amounts appropriated in Chapter 2, this will provide \$65 million in each year of the 2024-2026 biennium.
  - ☐ General Assembly approved on July 18th
- Skill Games
  - There have been several bills introduced during the Special Session however none have been considered by a legislative committee
  - There is a possibility that the General Assembly convenes again later this fall to consider skill games legislation
- ☐ The Special Session convened on May 13th and the General Assembly is procedurally still in session and may come back to Richmond at the call of leadership

### **Interim Legislative Work**

- Hampton's Community Development team has been very active in the Virginia First Cities (VFC) Access to Housing Workgroup
  - **□** We expect legislative recommendations will be presented later this fall
- ☐ The City Attorney's Office is involved in a FOIA Council study of SB 324 that will review the costs of FOIA requests
- Several Members of the Hampton City Council have been actively participating in the Virginia Municipal League policy committees
- ☐ The Two Capitols team is monitoring several important legislative commission and committees ahead of the 2025 General Assembly to include:
  - **☐** Virginia Housing Commission
  - **□** Public Procurement Workgroup
  - **☐** FOIA Council
  - House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees
  - **□** Joint Commission on Technology and Science

### 2025 Legislative Agenda Timeline

#### **Mid-October**

Draft and present legislative agenda with coordination from City Council, City Manager, and City Attorney

#### Mid-November/End of November

Finalize legislation for General Assembly members and have bills pre-filed (deadline for pre-filed drafting is November 25, 2024) We expect bill limits of 15 in the House and 20 in the Senate

#### **August-October**

Gather ideas for the legislative package to present to City Council for discussion

#### **Early November/Mid-November**

Finalize legislative agenda and present for approval by City Council

Start sharing legislative package with members of the General Assembly

#### December

Finalize any budget amendments

Session starts January 8, 2025 at Noon (45 day session)
