

- Minimum cost of \$50,000
- Finance long-term projects
- Life expectancy of at least 5 years

How do we pay for projects?

Bonds Municipal loans

General fund City revenues/taxes

Dedicated sources

Revenues from certain taxes/fees

State, federal and grants

One-time for special projects

Historical Comparison









Planning Commission

- On Thursday, April 7, 2016 the Planning Commission held a Public Hearing.
- Planning Commission Recommend the 2017-2021 Capital Improvement Plan and FY17 Capital Improvement Budget based on its consistency with the Hampton Community Plan be forwarded to the City Manager for inclusion in the City Manager's Recommended Operating and Capital Budgets for Fiscal 2017.

What happens next?

- City Council Public Hearing on the Capital Improvement Plan
 –May 4, 2016
- City Council will have an opportunity to modify the Plan prior to adoption.
- The first year of the five-year plan is incorporated in the Manager's Recommended Budget as the Capital Budget component.
