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Narrative statement

The crisis center, operated by Hampton-Newport News Community Services Board (H-NNCSB), will significantly enhance access to timely treatment for individuals experiencing behavioral health crises. Presently, the lack of immediate access to varying levels of care during periods of behavioral health crises results in law enforcement and emergency departments becoming the de facto response. As a result, individuals may wait days for the appropriate treatment options/placement to be identified. This overburdens our law enforcement personnel who are at times maintaining custody of individuals for days within the emergency departments, neither of which has the bandwidth or ability to appropriately respond to treatment needs. Critical law enforcement and emergency department resources are instead encumbered that would otherwise be applied to other public safety and emergency healthcare duties. This has a profound impact on communities. While a need prior, this has been increasingly problematic since the beginning of the pandemic.

Hampton-Newport News Community Services Board (H-NNCSB), created in 1971, is an extension of local government and is identified in the Code of Virginia as the entry point to the public behavioral health system. H-NNCSB is accountable to our local governments which appoints our 15-member Board of Directors. In our 51st year of operation, we continue to respond to needs of the community with an array of crucial services for citizens, serving approximately 11,000 individuals annually. Our service to the community includes new and long-term critical partnerships including but limited to law enforcement, jails, courts, schools, department of human services and other public and private partners. H-NNCSB is a major employer on the Peninsula with over 700 employees (when fully staffed). Our main campus is located in Hampton only blocks away, directly off of Marcella Road, where we have been located since 2006.

The crisis center will operate 24/7 providing an array of intervention including the ability of police to transfer custody of individuals under an emergency custody order (ECO) to onsite law enforcement. This will increase both the efficiency of custody when relevant in a more suitable therapeutic environment and the number of officers providing public safety duties, while also allowing treatment and intervention to begin in a timely manner. The number of onsite law enforcement may be variable dependent on number of individuals under ECO at a given time to ensure safety. Most individuals served will not require custody. Security will be onsite 24/7 also working in coordination with local law enforcement maintaining custody onsite and those transferring custody returning to their public service duties.

The center will allow for walk-in access for those individuals voluntarily seeking assessment and treatment. Currently, the default response leads to individuals experiencing behavioral health crises presenting directly to the Emergency Department at Sentara CarePlex Hospital, which is not staffed or resourced to provide the appropriate care. A continuum of service options will include behavioral health urgent care, "23hr. observation" services and short-term residential crisis stabilization. Specific service components of further detailed below. There will be 16-recliners identified for individuals to receive initial care, evaluation, treatment and observation for up to a 23- hour period. This will be essential to earlier engagement and beginning treatment that otherwise may not be done timely. This will also assist with preventing the impact of long-waits for care or exacerbation of crises. Lastly, 16 single-occupancy rooms, separate from 23hr services will provide short-term residential admissions for individuals,

typically lasting between 3 and 7 days. H-NNCSB currently operates a smaller crisis residential program located just blocks away from proposed site.

Presently, access to inpatient behavioral healthcare is at a critical point significantly impacting opportunities for individuals to receive timely mental health treatment. This often leads to further decompensation and interferes with individuals' willingness to engage in ongoing services to maintain their ongoing mental and physical health needs. The pandemic has led to surging behavioral health needs of individuals throughout all communities spanning across all ages and socio-economic classes, further contributing to a number of other significant challenges in our community. The delay in access to behavioral health treatment has significantly detracted from the police's ability to engage in other public safety activities and patrol, including community violence which is currently at significant levels.

H-NNCSB will lease the property from MPB, Sentara Healthcare. The building has been unoccupied for several years and offers 20,284 sq. feet. The site is currently zoned Limited Commercial (C-2) District, which allows medical offices use and some medical facilities; however, the Coliseum Central Overlay (O-CC) District does not currently allow the proposed use. The property is a single dwelling and will house an array of onsite services including the aforementioned onsite crisis services. Components include clinical, nursing and medical assessments, crisis intervention, supportive counseling, therapy, peer support services, psychiatric evaluation, "23hr. observation" services, and residential crisis stabilization services. Discharge planning services including referral and linkage to ongoing supports and services available for those receiving the range of services. Aside from renovations to the existing building, the plan would include well-manicured landscaping in addition to refurbishing the exterior and replacing the roof, windows and doors. The building and the addition of fencing and shrubbery separating it from adjacent properties.


The current site plan includes 125 parking spaces that will be downsized to by adding more handicap and larger truck space but will still exceed parking requirements. An enclosed outdoor patio area is planned for the residential component of the program reusing the existing outdoor break area used by the previous tenants. The outdoor space for the residents will have a plantings buffer between the adjacent properties and the CSB property. The space will be fenced and only used during daylight hours. There will be a staff member with residents using the space as an area of respite during treatment. The parking lot will be well lit and monitored. There be exterior camera system around the perimeter of building. Access to the building will be card access for staff with only one point of entry for the public leading directly to a secure waiting room

The current loading dock area will remain in use for delivery of building supplies. There will be no after hour deliveries. The entire parking lot will be resurfaced. The property offers two entry ways from Marcella Road. It will include a one-way traffic loop around the building which will be used for law enforcement, paramedics, and staff. Law enforcement and paramedics will have use of a separate entrance with a secure entry point on the west side of the building adjacent to existing commercial properties. A planting buffer will be installed between the properties. Parking located at the front of the building will be accessible to visitors and other professionals. The property will be well-lit and include onsite security, partnership with law enforcement, internal and external cameras, and a security system. It will be a locked, secured facility.

H-NNCSB currently operates our existing residential crisis stabilization program only blocks away and has established longstanding relationships with community partners. H-NNCSB will partner with Sentara Healthcare to provide ancillary professional services based on the relief the crisis center will provide to the surrounding community areas and to their Emergency Departments. The crisis center's focus on behavioral health needs will free up hospital resources to respond to medical emergencies.

The site will employ approximately 75 professionals delivering around-the-clock care when at full operating capacity. This will include existing personnel with our emergency services department,

discharge planners, and mobile crisis that will add value to the operations. The urgent behavioral health care, 23hr. observation and residential crisis services will share professional staff to include but not limited to: reception, environmental services, security, direct care professionals, Certified Peer Support Specialists, Certified Preadmission Screening Counselors (CPSC), Qualified Mental Health Professionals (QMHP), Licensed-Eligible Clinicians, Licensed Clinical Social Workers, Licensed Professional Counselors, Registered Nurses (RN), Licensed Practical Nurses (LPN), Medical and Psychiatric Nurse Practioners, and Psychiatrists. As a locked facility, the center will be appropriately staffed and secured at all times.

Critical law enforcement and emergency department resources are instead encumbered that would otherwise be applied to other public safety and emergency healthcare duties. This has a profound impact on communities. While a need prior, this has been increasingly problematic since the beginning of the pandemic.

The pandemic has led to surging behavioral health needs of individuals throughout all communities spanning across all ages and socio-economic classes, further contributing to a number of other significant challenges in our community. The delay in access to behavioral health treatment has significantly detracted from the police's ability to engage in other public safety activities and patrol, including community violence which is currently at significant levels.

Components of Care

The crisis center will operate 24/7 providing an array of intervention Components include clinical, nursing and medical assessments, crisis intervention, supportive counseling, therapy, peer support services, psychiatric evaluation, "23hr. observation" services, and residential crisis stabilization services. Discharge planning services including identification of needs, referral and linkage to ongoing supports and services available. Discharge planning is available for those receiving the range of services at the center. It will include the ability to provide or coordinate transportation from the center for individuals who have presented and received the different levels or care.

Walk-in Behavioral Health

The center will allow for walk-in access for those individuals voluntarily seeking assessment and treatment. Currently, the default response leads to individuals experiencing behavioral health crises presenting directly to the Emergency Department at Sentara CarePlex Hospital, which is not staffed or resourced to provide the appropriate care.

Law Enforcement Transfer of Custody

Will enable police to transfer custody of individuals under an emergency custody order (ECO) to onsite law enforcement. This will increase both the efficiency of custody when relevant in a more suitable therapeutic environment and the number of officers providing public safety duties, while also allowing treatment and intervention to begin in a timely manner. The number of onsite law enforcement may vary and be dependent on the number of individuals under ECO at a given time to ensure safety. Most individuals served will not require custody. Security will be onsite 24/7 also working in coordination with local law enforcement maintaining custody onsite and those transferring custody returning to their public service duties.

23-Hour Observation

Among the continuum of service options will include behavioral health urgent care, "23hr. observation" services. This service will allow for a period of assessment, treatment and stabilization for individuals up to 23 hrs. There will be 16-recliners identified for individuals to receive initial care, evaluation, treatment and observation for up to a 23- hour period. This will be essential to earlier engagement and beginning treatment that otherwise may not be done timely therefore not requiring more restrictive levels of care. This will also assist with addressing the impact that long-waits for care have on exacerbating crises. Currently, individuals may wait in the Emergency Department significant periods of time before treatment can be initiated and in an environment that may not be suitable for someone experiencing a behavioral health crisis.

Residential Crisis Stabilization Unit

Lastly, 16 single-occupancy rooms, which are separate from the 23-Hour services will provide short-term residential admissions for individuals, typically lasting between 3 and 7 days. H-NNCSB currently operates a smaller crisis residential program located just blocks away and has established longstanding relationships with community partners. H-NNCSB will partner with Sentara Healthcare to provide ancillary professional services based on the relief the crisis center will provide to the surrounding community areas and to their Emergency Departments. The crisis center's focus on behavioral health needs will free up hospital resources to respond to medical emergencies. This will allow for increase in capacity further reducing numbers of individuals unable to receive the care and mitigate the significant travel that may be necessary for someone to receive this level of treatment.

Property

H-NNCSB will lease the property from MPB, Sentara Healthcare. The building has been unoccupied for several years and offers 20,284 sq. feet. The site is currently zoned Limited Commercial (C-2) District, which allows medical offices use and some medical facilities; however, the Coliseum Central Overlay (O-CC) District does not currently allow the proposed use. The property is a single dwelling and will house an array of onsite services including the aforementioned onsite crisis services.

Signage

Signage for the center will identify the operator, Hampton-Newport News Community Services Board and along with the building and landscaping identify it as an environment that welcoming, warm and supportive for individuals who are in need of immediate behavioral health supports and may otherwise not seek care at all or timely.

Parking

The number of parking spaces with the current site plan will be reduced. The entire parking lot will be resurfaced. The parking lot will be well lit and along with the perimeter of the building and entrances will be monitored via a camera system. Access to the building will be card access for staff with <u>only one</u> point of entry for the public leading directly to a secure waiting room.

The current loading dock area will remain in use for delivery of building supplies. There will be no after hour deliveries. The property offers two entry ways from Marcella Road. It will include a one-way traffic loop around the building which will be used for law enforcement, paramedics, and staff. Law enforcement and paramedics will have use of a separate entrance with a secure entry point on the west side of the building adjacent to existing commercial properties. A planting buffer will be installed between the properties.

Visitor parking will be located at the front of the building and be accessible to visitors and other professionals. Sufficient parking exists for all visitors and includes access to both entrance points on Marcella Drive not requiring to loop around the building for entry or exit of the property. The lot along with the sole public entrance will be well-lit and offer camera and patrol of the security guard allotted to the center 24/7.

Landscape Buffering & Fencing

In addition to interior renovations, refurbishing of the exterior, and replacing the roof, windows and doors, the plan would include well-manicured landscaping. This will include the addition of shrubbery and fencing separating it from adjacent properties to promote a warm and discreet treatment setting and to provide additional layer of security for our staff and patrons.

Enclosed Patio

An enclosed outdoor patio area is planned for the residential component of the program reusing the existing outdoor break area used by the previous tenants. The outdoor space for the residents will have a plantings buffer between the adjacent properties and the CSB property. The space will be fenced and only used during daylight hours. There will be a staff member with residents using the space as an area of respite during treatment.


