



Community Building & Empowerment

- Increase in percentage of students saying they feel safe in their schools and neighborhoods
- Decrease in violent incidents in schools (assaults, threats, fights)
- Increase in voluntary contacts with city governments (codes and compliance, and police)
- Decrease in the number of abandoned, blighted properties

Education

- Increase in percentage of kindergarten students successful on the fall literacy screening
- Increase in the percentage of third grade students reading on grade level
- Decrease in chronic absenteeism (defined as missing 10% or more instructional days)
- Increase in the HIGH SCHOOL graduation and completion rate

Out of School Time Activities

- Increase in percentage of students engaged in positive out of school time activities
- Decrease in incidents involving juveniles between the hours of 3 and 9 p.m. and during the weekends and summer hours when they would normally be in school

Employment

- Increase in percentage of students earning industry certifications
- Increase in percentage of students with summer employment or internships

Public Health

Family Support





M HOUSING

RPOP plans to increase the number of homeowners in Russell by 25% by creating 135 new owner-occupied homes, some of which will be constructed as duplexes or with accessory apartments to create an immediate wealth building opportunity for buyers. RPOP will offer tenant incentives in the form of matched savings to residents of these units to encourage longevity of tenancy and to create a wealth building mechanism for renters.



CONNECTORS. ORGANIZERS. GAP FILLERS. ACCELERATORS.

As Connectors we connect residents, faith leaders, community based organizations, and small businesses to resources for stability and growth.

As Organizers we organize the existing resources to best support residents, faith leaders, community based organizations, and business owners' individual and community wealth building goals.

As Gap fillers we work towards filling in the gaps residents, faith leaders, community based organizations, and small business owners have identified as a need to reach the collective vision of Black wealth for Russell.

As Accelerators we support efforts led by residents, faith leaders, community based organizations, and small business owners to learn, build, lead, and grow Black wealth in Russell.



RPOP's small business strategy is dually focused on creating new, resident-owned businesses and strengthening existing Black-owned businesses to help them remain in Russell. Black-owned businesses in Russell are essential to the neighborhood's culture and economy. We completed the first cohort of the Russell Small Business Accelerator, designed to support existing Black-owned businesses and Black entrepreneurs strengthen and grow their businesses.

OF NEIGHBORHOOD ASSETS

One of the central elements of RPOP's Black wealth creation strategy involves the development of community-owned real estate assets in Russell. The Madison Street Warehouse, RPOP's first major capital project, is a site currently owned by Louisville Metro Government but committed to RPOP. Located at Russell's intersection of 30th and Madison Street, the property spans 5 acres and is neighbored by a newly developed Sports and Learning Complex. At RPOP, we intend to support the community-driven redevelopment of the property through on-site community conversations and our Russell for Russell (R4R) resident process. R4R will lead to the creation of the Madison Street Work Group to center resident voice and guide all aspects of the development process. Our goal is to create a structure with shared ownership and a variety of uses defined by Russell residents.




