CALL TO ORDER/ROLL CALL

Wednesday, September 12, 2018

Mayor Tuck called the meeting to order at 2:48 p.m. with all members of the City Council present.

Councilman Brown gave the invocation.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO FLAG

MAYOR'S COMMENTS

Mayor Tuck stated that the City Council had decided to move the Legislative Session to 2:00 p.m. and there will be a truncated agenda.

Mayor Tuck stated that the City should be thankful that it will not be experiencing the full brunt of Hurricane Florence. He thanked City staff for the preparations that have been made to have a successful experience with this impending storm.

City Manager Mary Bunting stated that the track of Hurricane Florence has moved such that it does not appear the City will be experiencing the impact feared earlier in

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the week. This does not mean that the City will not be impacted. Hurricane Isabel, which was a Tropical Storm when it reached the City, had winds, coupled with saturated grounds that caused great damage. This is similar to the situation the City is currently in. There was flooding over the weekend, just from an intense rain event. The City will still experience rain, higher tides, and high winds. These will interfere with power lines and trees. The City is still prepared for the worst. Staff has been working around the clock and will not relax its efforts.

Ms. Bunting stated that two shelters remain open, Phenix and Bethel. Phenix has the ability to care for those who require power-dependent medical equipment. There is also transportation available, and the best way to obtain that type of support is by calling 311. There is also an animal shelter available at Bethel. There are already citizens in the shelters.

Ms. Bunting noted that Public Works is being proactive and trying to clear out drains and get debris off the streets. She reminded citizens that they should never put their trash toters out early and anyone who has a toter out on the street needs to bring it back in and secure it.

Ms. Bunting stated that citizens should have hurricane preparedness kits and be prepared to be without power. The general rule of thumb is at least three days, although from previous experience, this can sometimes take longer. She emphasized that the Governor's evacuation order for Zone A was mandatory and it has not been lifted. It is not the City's place to rescind the Governor's order, and she encourages people to heed the order to avoid the effects of rain and storm surge impacts to the City.

Ms. Bunting stated that 311 remains ready to answer questions. The City updates most frequently and quickly on the City's Facebook page.

Ms. Bunting stated that she called for a Local Declaration of Emergency earlier this week, and it is Council's responsibility to ratify that declaration within seven days.

Ms. Bunting stated that historically, the City has waived permit fees for residents and businesses that have damage due to natural disasters. While she hopes this kind of damage will not occur with this storm, if this does occur staff is asking for Council's permission to waive those fees.

Mayor Tuck acknowledged Mr. Stefan Smi, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Public Assistance Region III Representative. Mr. Smi stated that there has been excellent collaboration between FEMA and the State to go to local jurisdictions to ensure that there are no unmet critical needs. He stated that he has experienced excellent communication and teamwork at the Emergency Operations Center, and he looks forward to working with the City to move efforts forward.

Mayor Tuck noted that a FEMA representative came to the City after Hurricane Matthew, and it is great to have a representative here ahead of the storm.

REPORTS BY CITY MANAGER, CITY COUNCIL, STAFF, COMMITTEES

Mayor Tuck asked the City Manager to address the issue of parking during the storm. Ms. Bunting stated that the City only owns one garage, which is located on Settlers Landing. It is available for all citizens who would like to move their cars to that location, and it is always available for that purpose during storms. The Peninsula Town Center has also offered the first and third floors of their parking garage. Because it is a private facility, they noted that they do not take responsibility for vehicles parked there. The City is currently in discussion with other local businesses. She noted that Langley Speedway proactively volunteered their parking lot for citizens to use.

Mayor Tuck noted the mandatory evacuation was issued for the sake of caution. He stated that he volunteered during the Hurricane Katrina recovery relief, which included delivering goods for those who decided to shelter in place. Almost all of those residents regretted the decision to stay. He knows there is a temptation to try to ride out the storm, but this is a storm we have not experienced before. Citizens need to be aware that all avenues to get in and out of their homes will be blocked, and this is dangerous to first responders. While it is the decision of the citizen to shelter in place, there may not be resources available if that citizen has an emergency.

Mayor Tuck stated that there was a reverse 311 call on Public Works not collecting trash on Thursday and Friday. There are those who have put yard waste out ahead of those collections days, or leave their grass clippings in the street. He noted that if citizens are complaining about clogged drains, they need to look to their neighbors and themselves, who choose to do these things. All yard waste needs to be removed. Normal collections may not resume immediately, as those crews will be working on debris removal.
