PUBLIC COMMENT

The Clerk read the protocol for the public comment period.

Mr. David Born greeted those on the dais and made the following statement: I was here last month talking about Otley Road, it's a private lane. The ordinance you all passed in 2011 restricting the building on private lanes, I just finally found out last month why you passed that ordinance. What I would like to ask now is to have a meeting with the powers that be. What I would like is to make an amendment to this ordinance, let the City inspectors, let the fire inspectors, the State - whoever inspectors go to these roads that are in question and see if the fire trucks and City trucks can get up and down them. On Otley Road, the fire trucks - I sit in my kitchen (I'm right behind Otley Road and right behind Moss Avenue) or in my yard all the time - the fire trucks come off Ivey Home Road, down Moss Avenue, they take a right on Otley Road and go out to Ivey Home Road. They do not turn around on Moss Avenue. It is hard to do, so they make that right and go right on down Otley Road. When they come in off of Ivey Home Road onto Otley Road, they go right on down Otley Road and take a left on Moss Avenue and head out of there. There's easy access. Your City trash trucks come down there every Friday. They don't have no problem. You'll have landlocked us and many other roads that are private lanes in Hampton with this ordinance. I work all over the City. If you will drive down North King Street, City roads - there's Beverly Street, Lamington Road, and other roads - I can't turn my pickup truck around in those roads. I've got to back up in somebody's driveway to get out of there. Those are City roads. You'll have made an ordinance on us. We can't build on a private lane because of that reason. On Otley Road, you can do it. I see them do it all the time. I would like to have a meeting with whoever the powers be so that we can discuss this and not take three minutes and give us the option to let your inspectors come in there, issue us a permit if the fire trucks and City trucks can go down there. Look for yourself. This ordinance that you've put on us land locks everybody. You'll made some mistakes in the past. I've been getting permits in Hampton since 1972. You'll do a lot of

research before you issue permits. You've issued permits on some private lanes where it's hard to get the fire trucks in and out. It ain't hard to get out on Otley Road, I will tell you that, because I see them all the time. Thank you much. Please, please give me an opportunity to have a meeting with whoever so we can get this done. I've got a buyer who wants to get this property.

Mr. Andrew Stith greeted those on the dais and made the following statement: I came here a couple of times - lots of times. The issue that I want to speak about is very dear to my heart and hopefully it will happen in my lifetime. Two great Americans that I think that need streets named after or renamed after them are President Obama and the late Harriet Tubman. President Obama is very important, not just because he was the former President of the United States, he basically got the permission or got the approval and the approval went through Congress to make a way that Fort Monroe, that is closed now, could be a National Park and (he) also basically put Hampton on the map. Hampton's already been on the map already, but I think that he should have a street named after him. I think for the State of Virginia, since we are a first of everything, I think we should be the first to name a street after him. Also, Harriet Tubman, yes through history, she was a slave freeing lots of slaves through the Underground Railroad, dismal swamp and etc. But, being born and raised here, I didn't know that she was a nurse at Fort Monroe for the Army to heal and to serve soldiers while they were wounded during the war. So, I think that these two Americans should have streets named after them here in the City. I think we should give them something because they are a part of our history, not just black history, but they are part of our history, worldwide history.
